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Kunsthaus Zürich invites to its extension preview with William Forsythe

From 23 April to 24 May 2021, the Kunsthaus Zürich invites to a preview of its new extension with a work by choreographer William Forsythe (b. 1949). 'The Sense of Things', conceived specially for this preview, can be experienced exclusively for four weeks in the museum's new building by architect David Chipperfield. It is the first artistic intervention in the new space. Admission will be free at Whitsun.

Curated by Mirjam Varadinis, 'The Sense of Things' encourages the visitor to build a direct relationship with the architecture that will house some of the most important works from the Kunsthaus Zürich and private collections.

BELLS AND CONFLICTS

In Forsythe's acoustic intervention, deconsecrated church bells of different sizes, pitches and timbres will be activated in a contrapuntal composition distributed across the spaces of the new extension. Church bells are complex instruments that have widely differing and sometimes contradictory histories: in medieval times they were thought to possess magical powers and their sound was believed to have a positive impact on people's lives. During conflicts and wars they were used to warn of enemy attacks, while in the Second World War, more than 100,000 of them were melted down and used to make cannons and other weapons. As Forsythe puts it: 'These bells are like ghosts of the history of European conflicts.'

VISITORS TAKE CENTRE STAGE

At the same time, the bells announce the advent of a new era for the museum and enable visitors to explore the still-unoccupied Chipperfield building individually. There is no map of how to visit the building, Forsythe explains. Instead, 'The Sense of Things' emphasizes the visitor's curiosity as key to apprehending the composition, the nuances of which are shaped by each visitor's gradually unfolding, investigative relationship to the building and its acoustics.

THE MUSEUM AS SOUNDING BODY

In his staging of Chipperfield's building, Forsythe views and apprehends the building itself as a kind of inner ear or eardrum – a sensory organ – with a volume

through which we can hear and feel. 'The Sense of Things' allows us to experience the museum as location in a new way and is attuned to people in all worlds of sensory experience. This is also reflected in the accompanying programme, with guided tours provided by people who have a different perception and physical sensitivity due to their very special constitution – such as blind and deaf people, but also children.

A SENSE OF PURPOSE

With their new cooperation, the Kunsthaus Zürich and Forsythe wish to offer the broadest possible public a place where, after tremendous social disruption, community can once again be recreated. Gathering to experience the inherent sound of a building is certainly an atypical activity but also an unexpectedly gentle way to introduce the museum as a site that will be performing a significant civic role in future.

PODCAST AND INFORMATION BROCHURE IN BRAILLE

In a further innovation, 'The Sense of Things' is accompanied by a podcast at the Kunsthaus Zürich featuring a conversation between William Forsythe, Emma McCormick-Goodhart (artist and writer) and Mirjam Varadinis (curator) on the background to the project: www.kunsthaus.ch/forsythe-podcast.
